Year 12 Trip to Alexandra School

My experience at Alexandra School interested me as to how each student works and how they understand things in their own way.

First, we had met the Co-Headteacher, she had given the class a small talk on how things work in the school and how communication is done with the children. As I sat in the room, I realised that there were objects on the table and floor like toys and blankets. The Headteacher had told us that these are the things that help the children as they are known as sensory items, designed to stimulate one or more of the senses. I also real-



ised that the chair I had been sitting on was a rocking chair and the Headteacher had stated that this helps the child to relax and refocus as some students aren't able to keep still. When it comes to communication the Headteacher had specifically spoken about the three ways teachers build the child's understanding and communication by using techniques made to help the children such as concrete, pictorial and abstract. Emotional support is very important in Alexandra School as it makes a student feel so much safer as they do not feel forced to do something if they do not want to do it. Teachers recognise and address individual learning and emotional needs; they also promote inclusivity and respect among students. The Headteacher also said that the classes are much smaller than a mainstream school, there are around 7 to 10 students in each class as if it is a sixth form class with little people. I believe that this is done so the children are not overwhelmed by others if they were to be in a larger class.

In a SEN (Special Educational Needs) school things are much calmer for the students as they have more time and much more freedom, unlike in a mainstream school things are much more difficult for the students as they do not have the same patience given to the students in the SEN school. Seeing the students in the classroom I was in, the teacher had pointed out that they all are different ages from one another. I had thought about this when she had told me because a person would think that same ages should be in same classes because of the brain would work the same when someone is the same age. However, in a SEN school, people who are heavily autistic would need to be in the year group they belong depending on how the child works or acts, this is so the child does not feel over pressured by doing something that does not reach their standards. I had also recognised that they keep cameras in their rooms, I hadn't asked about it but I had done my research and learned that it is so the kids are monitored to enhance student and staff safety, deter anti-social behaviour, and provide evidence in case of incidents or disputes, while also ensuring compliance with regulations. These schools are also lucky as their playground was a literal park, which you can't find in a mainstream school. Overall, my experience at Alexandra School was lovely, everyone was very welcoming, and the students were extremely friendly.

Year 12 Careers Day at Snapchat HQ

On Thursday, 13th March 2025, I had the incredible opportunity to visit Snapchat HQ during Empathy Week, alongside students from various schools across London. Overall, this experience allowed me to step out of my comfort zone multiple times, building both confidence and a deeper understanding of the workplace. I also learned about the various opportunities Snapchat offers to young professionals, making this an invaluable and inspiring visit.
