


Stress is a part of life.

We can't eliminate stress from Year 11, but we can recommend steps to take so that it does not negatively impact your grades.

The truth is that well managed stress (let's call it pressure), can help you to improve your grades. It can motivate you to work harder and achieve more.







GOOD ROUTINES

- Set regular study and homework routines.
- Help your child to stay organised regular conversations about upcoming tests or key dates/equipment for the classroom.
- Communicate with the school.
 Email/phone teachers for updates. <u>Use MyCAS</u> to monitor their punctuality and behaviour.
- Make sure they complete homework on time and to an agreed standard.
- Make sure they attend every day and on time.






GCSE

pupils with **no absence** are **2.2** times more likely to achieve 5+ GCSEs A*- C than pupils that missed 15-20% of KS4 lessons.



2022 data shows that when attendance had dropped between 5-9% the percentage of pupils getting grades 9-5 in Eng and Maths that in this group dropped by 30%





Research suggests that **17 missed school days** a year = 1 GCSE grade **DROP** in achievement.

Therefore, the greater the attendance the greater the achievement.

Be prepared and pace yourself

Your revision of knowledge and skills starts now. Do regular revision using effective techniques with plenty of breaks. 20 minutes of testing yourself on a topic rather than 1 hour of re-reading your text books is more effective revision and provides less stress


- A homework has been set for every subject, listing all the topics that are going to be in the Y11 Mocks.

- You should have at least two sessions of revision on every topic.






At Key stage 5 we saw **increases** in our student's attainment and increases especially in students attaining A* - C grades.







- What is the Harrow Sixth Form Collegiate?

- A collaborative network for outstanding post-16 education resulting in proven high attainment
- An outstanding curriculum provision through a wide, diverse range of courses including A-levels, AAQs/BTECs and vocational qualifications for students aged 16-19
- A proven route to university, employment or apprenticeships
- How does it work?
- Students can access courses from multiple schools and colleges as they operate a common timetable where lessons are taught in blocks – this means that students spend the morning session studying one subject followed by an afternoon studying another subject.
- This limits the number of times that a student is expected to travel between their home and away schools

This document ensures you can easily see where each subject is taught and helps you plan your choices across the Harrow Sixth Form Collegiate.



Rooks Heath's inclusive curriculum

AS/A level pathway

- Students start on either 3 or 4 A level subject in year 12 – dependent on GCSE APS (6.5 is our boundary)
- Students take the summer AS examination only for subjects they are not continuing to Year 13
- Continue with 3 A level subjects in year 13

AAQ/BTEC/WJEC Level 3 pathway

- Students study the equivalent of three A levels
- This is usually one diploma and one extended certificate but can be three extended certificates or AAQs
- They complete coursework or controlled assessment plus one or two external examinations for each subject in year 12 and 13

Our curriculum is flexible, students can mix and match AS/A levels with AAQs/BTEC Nationals and WJEC Applied Diploma qualifications to secure the combination of subjects which suits them best



What are AAQ/BTEC Level 3 Nationals or WJEC Applied Diplomas?

- Specialist, vocational-related qualification for students
- A more practical approach to study inspiring more confidence in some learners who traditionally worry about examinations
- Assessment is roughly a 50% split between internal coursework or controlled assessment and external examinations
- An accepted route to university these subjects are not easier than A levels and are valued highly by employers and universities





What are the entry requirements?

AS/A Levels

- 6 or more GCSEs at grades 9-5; including at least a grade 5 at Maths and English Language, you can choose to follow a programme of A level subjects in year 12
- There are some subject specific requirements e.g. Maths require at least a grade 6 at GCSE.
 Please refer to minimum entry requirements sheet

BTEC/WJEC Level 3 qualifications

- If you have 5 or more GCSEs at grades 9-4; including at least a grade 4 at Maths or English Language, you can study a BTEC National Level 3 programme
- You must have at least a grade 3 in GCSE Maths to study any level 3
- Students who have studied a BTEC at level 1/2 should have achieved at least a Pass at level 2 to carry that subject on, although some subject require a Merit

Students without a grade 4 or better in GCSE English or Mathematics will be expected to follow a timetabled re-sit programme.



Individualised support for Most Able students in their UCAS application

 Most Able students are supported with their university applications (either Oxford/Cambridge Universities or Medicine, Veterinary Science or Dentistry) through:

Lumina and St John's College, Oxford Inspire courses

 Regular meetings with the Most Able coordinator for help with writing the personal statement, choosing the most suitable college/university, preparing for entrance exams and performing well at interview










Student Leadership
