Teaching Research

A piece of research that Ms Gong completed with Year 9 students of Chinese had been selected for a presentation at the European Association of Chinese Teaching (EACT)'s 4th International Symposium at the University of Southampton.

The conference focused on Chinese Language Education in Secondary and Higher Education from a Multilingual and Multicultural Perspective. This research was led by Victor Wu from the Institution of Education (IOE), UCL and cooperated with 4 other secondary schools in the UK. In the presentation, Ms Gong's research group introduced the idea of launching soft CLIL in Chinese, which means some curricular topics are taught during a language course. Despite the difficulties in promoting secondary schools in the UK, we found that over 67% of our participants would like to learn Mandarin more innovatively (combined with other school subjects). This research was also selected for presentation at the 4th Biannual International CLIL conference at Sheffield Hallam University on 16th June 2023.

Year 11 School Prom




