We quickly embraced the remote learning opportunities to provide a comprehensive range of MOOCs (Massive Open Online Courses) and I am extremely proud of our students who seamlessly shifted to the new ways of learning. In a recent survey for Years 10 and 12 in preparation for their return, 80% of you reported that your child had an 'excellent' or 'good' level of engagement. This is very encouraging.

You have provided useful feedback which we continue to use to improve things for your children. We have moved to a blended learning approach and will extend live lessons more widely across the year groups. Later this month, we will share with you a different kind of progress tracker to help you see how well your children have engaged in our remote learning platform.

You may have heard about the 'laptops for schools' scheme. It may be helpful to note that this is a DFE scheme which allocates laptops or internet access to students in Year 10 only and who are in receipt of the Pupil Premium funding. If your child has difficulty accessing the internet, please get in contact with us and we will do our best to help.

The first phase of wider opening to students in Years 10 and 12 has been a success. It was a pleasure for many staff and students to see each other on site again. I know the students were very appreciative of the individualised and personalised attention they received. Our premises team did a fine job ensuring we meet all the government's guidelines to observe social distancing making our College premises feel very safe.



There has been much to celebrate during a time many may view as undesirable. Someone said, "don't waste a good crisis" and we have not. May saw the month of Kindness and staff put together a worthy <u>tribute</u> for our students. I hope you have found some time to view this, as well as all the <u>virtual assemblies</u>. We recently received news of a couple of Year 13 students receiving offers at Oxford University and I am pleased to inform you that one of our teachers, Mr Stuart Macaulay, was nominated for a University of Oxford Inspirational Teachers Award by a former student.


## 500 Words Competition




## Learning Support Update

Since lockdown began in March, Learning Support and the Student Support Hub have been in regular contact with students with EHCPs, High SEN Needs, Young Carers and others. To many of the parents/carers that we have spoken to, they have appreciated our weekly phone calls and sometimes, we have been the only person that they have spoken to outside of their homes. We have been able to support by helping with completing FSM forms, enquiries about the voucher scheme, resetting Canvas logins, arranging for paper-based work and much, much more. We are currently working to aid the transition back to school for some students before the end of term and thinking ahead to September.

Regular newsletters have been sent to parents/carers of students on the SEND register. This has been another way to build a positive partnership with the school and the families. In Issue #7, we created a photo message to let the students know that we miss them and have not forgotten them! You can see this on the last page of this newsletter. Zoom webinars have been held with parents to help to reassure them that Rooks Heath are following guidelines set by the government and that we are doing everything that we can to keep staff, students and families as safe as possible.



## With A Little Help from Our Friends

During the lockdown month of May the Rooks Heath staff band was invited by me to take part in a remote, musical recording experiment. We wanted to keep people motivated by doing something creative and a little different while working from home. Once we had chosen a song and the different parts were arranged and sent to the band's musicians, each performer recorded their parts remotely using online software called Band Lab (our music students are very familiar with this app!).

These parts were then collected and organised into my tiny home studio computer. As I was so surprised that everything seemed to work so well together, we thought we could take it to the next level. Mr Sharp sent out instructions for staff to video themselves playing along to what they had already recorded and an invitation to all staff to sing a line. Once edited together we thought it would be a lovely message to our students who we had not seen in weeks.

We also submitted our video to Headstone Manor & Museum's 'COVID-19 in Harrow'. The aim of the collection is to capture Harrow's lived experiences, stories and material on the pandemic as it evolves for future preservation. It also aims to help with the healing process by allowing us to process what has happened, acknowledge the human costs, and understand how it has affected the people and places in Harrow. Stacy, a Museum curator, sent the following message: "This is really beautiful; it came out wonderfully! You guys have really come together and supported each other during this crisis! I would love to acquire it into the collection."

Well done to everyone involved. We hope we have gone a little way to capturing the spirit of our school. We also hope that next time we will be able to include our many talented students.
